PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2017

This year has been a particularly busy one with preparations for the 2018 Australian Championships Carnival in South Australia, to be held in the Renmark, Adelaide and near Adelaide areas. The event draws upon many members time for which we are most appreciative.

A significant amount of time has been put in by members providing orienteering training at all levels every week. The schools clusters programme aimed at Primary Schools has been well attended by students, and it is pleasing to see parents involved, which has been one of the aims of the programme. Nevertheless much needs to be done to increase participation of juniors at events.

It has been most heartening to see the enthusiasm of participants in the Junior Arrows Squad in their training programme, which is primarily due to the dedication of our coaches, who themselves have brought a youthful leadership example to all.

Effort has been put into expanding the permanent orienteering courses, which from the recorded downloads of maps has proved popular. Additional funding is being sought to support this work.

Through the Australian Scholarship Program we are fortunate to have Manu Jurado from Spain. He has been involved in preparing a prodigious number of new orienteering maps and updating existing ones. He has also been active in running training programs for our members.

Much has been achieved by the dedicated support of our members in running the many activities necessary for sustaining our sport of orienteering. First class events have been run, coaching and training sessions, mapping and technical improvement activities undertaken. In particular I would like to thank our Management Committee members; Erica Diment, who does a huge amount of work as Secretary and involvement in training events, Robin Uppill - Chairperson of the 2018 Australian Championships Carnival and a broad range of technical support and promotion, Andrew Kennedy-Treasurer, Bridget Anderson - Coaching, Jan Hillyard- Newsletter, Kay Haarsma and Peter Mayer - MTBO, Ken Thompson - IT Manager, David Tilbrook - Publicity & Promotion.

Listed on the inside cover are the many other people who play fundamental and important roles in the presentation of our sport. Then there are the club office bearers, and delegates to OSA.

We continue to receive generous funding from the Office of Recreation and Sport. Funding is also available through Orienteering Australia, from the Australian Sports Commission and these grants are directed to those programmes which will increase participation. Both Orienteering SA and Top End have taken advantage of this source

FINANCIAL REPORT 2017

2017 was a year of change and also of consolidation. I'd like to thank everyone for getting on board with a more cashless approach to orienteering, and an electronic book keeping system that has streamlined processes and time and made reporting significantly easier.

Please find attached the unaudited *Balance Sheet* and *Profit and Loss* results for the association for calendar year 2017.

Of note, the association recorded a loss for the year of \$14,194.24, although this is entirely attributable to costs associated with the 2018 National carnival including Lidar, mapping, promotion, and pre-payment of some of the costs for the schools teams accommodation and supplies.

Overall the association was close to budget across all categories, although to note was the higher costs from moving headquarters, and a small underspend on some items.

Thank you to all who were able to provide timely email and scanned documents for receipts and payments, and to everyone who paid via electronic transfer.

2018 will provide challenges with the National carnival as it increases OSA's turnover by approximately 200%.

TECHNICAL REPORT 2017

The technical responsibilities include the following areas:

1. Application of rules and standards to orienteering events
2. Oversight of mapping standards (Adrian Uppill manages this area to assist the Technical Officer)
3. Maintenance of technical documents (posted on the OSA web site)
4. Manage appointment of controllers for required events and liaise with the OA Manager of Accreditation with respect to controller accreditation
5. Run training courses (course planning, controlling, mapping etc)
6. Monitor event safety standards
7. Represent OSA on the OA Technical Committee

Major Events

The major events held in 2017 were reduced from previous years due to a decision to no longer hold Long Distance Badge events, in part following a decision by Orienteering Australia to levy Badge event fees for Middle Distance and Sprint Distance Championships. Previously holding these as Badge events had been optional. In order to keep lower fees for these events in SA they had not been classified as Badge events. To replace the Long Distance Badge events, two of the OY events were classified as Long OY, offering a similar range of course – class combinations as Long Distance Badge events.

The Course Planner award was continued in 2017, with voting open for approximately 3 weeks after each event. The events were the above State Championship events, OY events and other forest events. The winner in 2017 was Steve Cooper for the SA Middle Distance Championships. Special mention is also made for David George for the SA Sprint Championships, and Angus Haines and Nick Congedi for the SA Club Relays at Flinders University. Feedback from the voting submissions was provided to the course planners.

The SA Club Relays was internally controlled by the Southern Arrows. Numbers again increased this year as each club could include non-club members in a team. In addition age restrictions were removed from all courses to enable clubs to more easily form teams.

Workshops and Technical Documents

An evening event management evening workshop held in March – the focus was to exclude championship events.

The following documents in the OSA Guidelines and Policies were updated

- Section 2.1 Course Specifications
- Section 2.2 Course Planning Guidelines
- Section 2.3 Event Organisation Guidelines

The IOF released a new mapping specification in 2017 – ISOM 2017 for forest maps. The IOF Control Descriptions were also updated with a new version released in late 2017 (dated 2018). A link is available on the web site to this document.

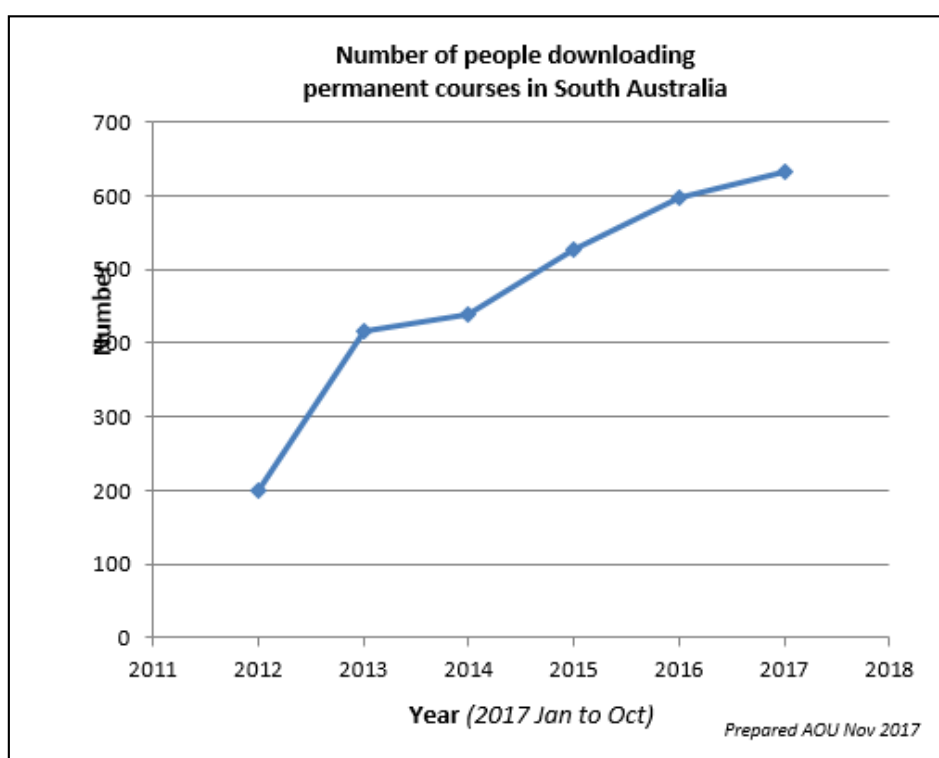
Mapping and Permanent Courses

Expansion of our permanent courses continues with the following underway in 2017. These are being funded using a grant from the Australian Sports Commission through Orienteering Australia.

1. APEX Park, Hawthorndene (OH) – approved by Mitcham Council with an official launch in August
2. St Johns Bushland Park, Lobethal (TT) - underway
3. Oaklands (OH) – negotiations underway with Marion Council, expect to be finalised in 2018
4. Shepherds Hill (TJ) – deferred until 2018

Downloads of maps is monitored and continues to increase as summarised in the graph below for part of 2017. The following should be noted:

- Number of individual downloads plotted below
- Each download may be for one or more maps
- Many downloads for groups record the number of likely participants (for the 2017 year totals 7000+)
- Groups include schools, defence groups, CFS, scouts, YMCA, various other groups
- Schools often provide a contact which we add to our school contact
- Use by schools provides a service that we couldn't otherwise meet if we had to provide coaches and events



Coaching scholars in SA (Stefano Raus over the 2016-17 summer and Manu Jurado over the 2017-18 summer) have added significantly to the available maps in suburban Adelaide. These include the extension and updates of parts of the Adelaide Parklands being mapped to sprint specification, and some maps that will be used only for training exercises (Wayville Showground and Marion Shopping Centre).

Further research in the use of LIDAR in the preparation of orienteering maps continued. Adrian Uppill, Stefano Raus, David George and Ian Grivell attended a 2 day workshop on Airborne Research Australia on process of LIDAR data for use in making orienteering maps. David prepared a report on the workshop outcomes. As a result OSA is now well placed to use LIDAR data effectively in orienteering map making. The report has been provided to Orienteering Australian who funded the workshop as part of a grant on LIDAR and orienteering maps. Coaching scholar Manu Jurado who has a background in use of LIDAR, and David George, gave presentations at an OA workshop on LIDAR held in conjunction with the Australian Orienteering Championships in NSW.

The relationship with Airborne Research Australia also resulted in the OSA engaging them to collect LIDAR data over three of the map areas to be used for the Australian Championships Carnival in 2018.

2018 Australian Championships Carnival Planning

Planning for the carnival continued in 2017. As for past carnivals, all events are run as OSA events rather than club responsibilities to enable best use of our volunteer resources. The program for the carnival was finalised and mapping of new areas completed in 2017. Existing maps will be updated in early 2018. Organisers, course planners and controllers were in place for most events, as were most of the main carnival roles. New web pages for the carnival were incorporated in the new OSA web site. Entries will be open early in 2018. Publicity fliers were also distributed at the 3 main carnivals in 2017 (Oceania Championships in New Zealand, Australian Three Days and the Australian Championships, both in NSW).

SCHOOLS REPORT 2017

This position has been vacant all year and has been held together by a team of Orienteering SA members who have worked together with a goal of providing coaching to schools as requested.

The government funded Sporting Schools funding to Primary Schools has made resources available to interested schools, but continued to put a strain on our limited supply of coaches and on the coordination.

Thanks to Robin Uppill who has managed the sporting schools website requirements. A team of coaches and mappers have supplied work at the request of schools.

Mappers have included some of the old guard and some of the up and coming mappers in SA, ably coordinated by Adrian Uppill. Thanks to all who have assisted in this area.

Coaches have been stretched at times, and we've been pleased to see some new faces, and some returning old faces. Kay Haarsma, David Tilbrook, Adrian Craig, Clive and Marian Arthur, Stefano Raus, Aylwin Lim, Peter Mayer and Ben Cazzolato have all been involved in this area.

School clusters commenced, with funding made available through an ASC grant for 2017. Clusters in the Hills (supported by Kay Haarsma) and Inner East (Supported by Ben Cazzolato and Aylwin Lim) were successful.

The individual schools championship was moved to May to allow for inclusion of promising juniors in the Junior Arrows Squad by invitation. Attendance was approximately the same in number as in previous years, but made up of a different mix of schools.

Thanks to Adrian Uppill who presented sessions during PE week for ACHPER. (The Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation)

The schools SI kit (purchased with a participation grant) has continued to be a big winner when used – with the instant enjoyment from splits readout on completion of courses, and ease of use of SI compared to punching and cards. This has been well used in the cluster groups and general training.

SOUTHERN ARROWS REPORT 2017

During 2017, a number of Arrows were selected in national squads. Bridget, Kerrin, Vanessa and Simon were part of the high performance squad, Will and Olivia were in the national development squad, and Dante, Nick, Angus and Meredith were included in the targeted athlete squad – quite a solid representative for the relative size of the state and the strong competition.

This year there were NOL rounds held in various locations from Tasmania and the ACT in March, NZ in April, Wagga Wagga NSW in June, ACT again in August and the national carnival in NSW in late September. Eighteen athletes represented the state in these various events.

In the W20E we were represented throughout the year by Sarah Lim who finished best placed overall at 9th, Meredith Norman (10th), and Alyce Heap (33rd). The junior women incredibly finished the season in 2nd place in the team standings.

In the M20E Angus Haines finished 8th overall, Dante Afnan (11th), Nicholas Congedi (14th) and newcomer Rohan Jackson (53rd). The junior men finished 5th overall for the season.

The W21E were represented by Bridget Anderson (6th), Jenny Casanova (17th), Olivia Sprod (24th) and visiting international student Kathrine Amby (46th). The senior women finished 4th overall for the season.

The M21E saw Simon Uppill rank as #1 for the season. Kerrin Rattray (15th), John Nieuwenhoven (38th), 2016-17 coach in residence Stefano Raus (43th), Ben Rattray (59th), 2017-18 coach in residence Manuel Jurado Alonso (59th), Will Kennedy (62nd), and former resident Brian Poon (77th). The senior men also managed a 4th place overall finish for the season – a remarkable effort from all teams.

Both Bridget Anderson and Simon Uppill were selected into the World Orienteering Championships (WOC) team.

On all occasions everyone represented the state with passion and enthusiasm, as evidenced by the continued strong performances and commitment to training, coaching, assisting with junior squads, and assisting in running events such as the Sprint Series and Relays for which the squad is grateful of the support of the community.

With the growth of junior numbers in squads, and more expected in 2018, we look forward with anticipation to seeing the development and future performance success from the athletes during 2018 and beyond.

Five members of our squad have nominated for the Junior World Orienteering Championships (JWOC). We hope that some of these will make the team.

The low turnout for SA Champs was partly due to a change of date and venue well after the program had been published. The date change was to avoid a clash with a major MTB event on the same day. Subsequently approval was given for a National Enduro event to be held at Fox Creek on our Champs day.

We have made firm arrangements that we will have exclusive use for Forestry SA areas for events planned for this year.

Remaining Grant money was used in 2017 for further mapping and publicity.

The MTBO events continue to gather only small attendance numbers.

A survey was sent to the MTBO mailing list and received over 30 responses. Most were happy with the mass start score format and a majority preferred Sunday morning events. The Sunday events also make it easier for setters.

The small numbers who do come to MTBO events enjoy the experience but we need to be more proactive in publicising through bike shops and clubs.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REPORT 2017

1) New Website: On Friday 1st Dec our new website went live. After a few minor glitches the site seems to be running smoothly now. Much of the layout has been planned by Robin Uppill in association with Openwire in Western Australia. It is hoped that you will find the new site easier to navigate and attractive. With permission from Orienteering WA we have used much of their structure. I have been involved in transferring most of the content and getting everything working as we want it to be as well as transferring our email system to the new site. The total cost of establishing the new site has been \$4585.75
 Ongoing costs of hosting: Initially \$55/month incl GST. This will increase to about \$70 based on the actual size of our website (approx. \$5 per 100 MB)

3. Sport Vouchers: is a State Government initiative administered by the Office for Recreation & Sport. It is an opportunity for primary school students (i.e. R-7 attending in 2017) to receive a \$50 discount off membership fees. This can also be used to reduce the cost of family membership. There were 353 students competing from 28 schools, some coming from as far as Woodside Primary School, Crafers Primary School, Stirling East Primary School, Heathfield High School and Lobethal Lutheran School. The schools with the highest numbers contesting on the day were: East Adelaide Primary School with 41 students, Aberfoyle Park High School 31 students, Linden Park Primary School 29 Students and Woodside Primary School 37 students and it was noted that most of these students ran alone, not in pairs.
