PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2022

This year has become a lot less restrictive because of COVID 19, allowing event management to return to pre COVID activity.

Comprehensive details on the year's activities by committee members are included in the Report.

The year started off with a new approach by co - Editors Erica Diment and Leila Henderson to SA Orienteer, but with great acknowledgement of the valuable contribution by Frank Burden who has been our Editor for many years.

It is gratifying to thank all the volunteers that put so much time into our sport, from establishing permanent courses, mapping, setting courses, and running events to the many hours of coaching provided in particular to our juniors, the results of which are clearly evident from the successful results attained. I have been particularly impressed by the contributions made by our younger members in mapping areas and running events.

At the OSA presentations the very deserving recipient of the John Hall Memorial Service Award was Bridget Uppill.

Congratulations to the Orienteer of the Year award winners, listed here in the Report. Course Planner of the Year was Jack Marschall. The Sue Millard Trophy was presented to the most improved junior orienteers: Zoe Carter and Ben Marschall, with great performances on the national stage.

We have had some outstanding performances on the international stages of JWOC, WOC and WUOC.

It is commendable that efforts have been made to improve the profile of orienteers through the Pathways Posters. This complements the enormous effort put into coaching as part of OA's New Coaching Framework. The introduction of Kid-O for our very youngest members from 0 to 7 makes for an entertaining and early exposure to orienteering.

There is a significant amount of information now available to improve the integrity of Australian Sport which also relates to orienteering. and is available on sportintegrity.gov.au.

The Sporting Schools and non-Sporting Schools orienteering program has introduced orienteering to some 4000 students, whilst the after school Zone orienteering involved 735 children as well as their parents.

There is a lot of work to be done in the lead up to the 2024 Australian 3 Days Championships in SA. Technical Director, Jenny Casanova and Carnival Coordinator, Al Sankauskas look forward to considerable help from members to make this happen.

Forestry SA have been challenging to work with regarding off track access to native forest reserves. There has also been a considerable increase in fees to run events within their areas of control. A considerable amount of time has been put into preparing our case to overcome these restrictions, for consideration by the Minister for Forest Industries.

In particular I would like to thank our Management Committee members; Fi Pahor - Secretary, Robin Uppill – a broad range of technical support and promotion, Andrew Kennedy – Treasurer, Bridget Uppill – Coaching, Leila Henderson– Newsletter Editor, Publicity and Promotion, Erica Diment co-Newsletter Editor, Kay Haarsma and Peter Mayer – MTBO, Ken Thompson – IT Manager, and Zita Sankauskas – Schools Coordinator.

Listed on the inside cover are the many other people who play fundamental and important roles in the organisation of our sport. Then there are the club office bearers, and delegates to the OSA Committee.

We continue to receive generous funding from the State and Federal Governments, and through Orienteering Australia.

TECHNICAL REPORT 2022

Events

Through 2022 orienteering events were held as planned for most of the year. All of our major events were held in 2022 as scheduled. The approach for all events to be pre-entry only continued. Although this can make participating more difficult for newcomers, the load on volunteers at the event is much less. The major events and their controllers were:

The SA Club Relays were this year held on bush map, the northern part of Para Wirra. With printed results or a results display screen being discontinued during COVID, clubs were encouraged to provide online results using the LiveResults system in areas with mobile coverage. Onkaparinga Hills participated on behalf of OSA at the Belair Hiking Expo held at Belair National Park on April 3rd, offering a standard line course with SPORTIdent, 3 MapRun courses and a string course.

The 2022 Course planner award went to Jack Marshall for Sprint courses on the Roseworthy Campus of Adelaide University. Other highly ranked courses were Robert Smith for the SA Middle Distance Championships at Pymton, and Nigel Dobson for a Middle-Distance event at Bri-Glen.

Permanent Courses and MapRun Courses

A new set of permanent courses was established by Tintookies at Carisbrooke Park. Various other maps and courses were updated though 2022. This included the map and courses at Oaklands, these courses were added to MapRun.

Two of the MTBO courses from the SA MTBO Championships at O'Halloran Hill were also added as MapRun courses, see <https://www.sa.orienteering.asn.au/about-orienteering/new-to-orienteering/mobile-orienteering>.

Mapping

Work on the Adelaide Parklands map in 2022 was focused on maintenance as change is always happening.

The main focus in 2022 was selecting areas for the 2024 Australian 3 Days, and arranging LIDAR for maps to be updated as well as other areas for map update or new maps (including new areas north of Wilpena Pound). The LIDAR data should be collected early in 2023.

Many school maps were completed through the year, largely as part of the Sporting Schools Program. These were in both suburban and rural schools (Hawker in the Flinders Ranges to Tintinara in the Southeast). Maps are done using the IOF Schools Mapping Symbol set (Sprint Specification with extra symbols). Orienteering on SA Forestry Land

Organizing scheduled events in SA Forestry land has become more difficult for a number of reasons

1. A approx. 400% increase in fees per person in 2021 (e.g. from \$2 per adult to more than \$7 per adult)
2. A requirement to pay event fees prior to the event which is difficult with event pre-entry closing only the Thursday prior to the event
3. Very late receipt of event approvals, sometimes with conditions that are difficult to meet
4. Requirement that orienteering does not use native forest reserves, even though these areas have been used for orienteering for more than 20 years without problems, and orienteering may actually be permitted in these areas in management plans. Some exceptions occur e.g. areas available for fossicking in the Watts Gully area.

Orienteering in SA Water Reservoir Land

Discussions with SA Water regarding use of reservoir land for orienteering have specified the conditions of use as follows

- Subject to further detail/information, SA Water is broadly supportive of orienteering events on SA Water land (as they align well with our *Enjoy.Explore.Preserve* ethos) on the basis that they:
 - are restricted to publicly accessible areas (further detail on each reservoir site can be found at www.reservoirs.sa.gov.au)
 - occur in accordance with the conditions of access including opening/closing times
 - do not unduly impact upon other users/visitors to the site (exclusive use of the site will not be available and any activities will need to work around other visitors)
 - occur on designated tracks/grassland areas only so as to limit potential for trampling/damage to native vegetation

With respect to some reservoirs:

1. Happy Valley – TJ are interested in pursuing orienteering at this reservoir, however it is probably too limited for other than a minor event. The Southeast part of the land has been mapped, however TJ are still negotiating the establishment of a permanent course.
2. Mt Bold public –, apart from a small area in the SW part which would be pleasant for short cross country courses but currently not meeting the SA Water the guidelines, the remaining part of the area with public tracks, is limited. And the forest is either very thick and steep native forest, or very steep pine plantations, some is recently cleared and replanted.
3. Myponga – OH may be interested in establishing a permanent course there which would be track based

Due to the high visitation rates (walkers, joggers, cyclist) these are worth pursuing for permanent courses due to the publicity this provides for orienteering.

National Activities

1. OA Controller Curricula Update

Jenny Casanova and Robin Uppill participated in an OA Project to update the 3 levels of Controller Curricula. These have been reviewed were finalized for OA Board approval early in 2023.

2. Mapping Workshop

A workshop was held in conjunction with the Australian Orienteering Championships Carnival, include presentations from Czech orienteer Ludek Krticka, a member of the IOF Map Commission, Adrian Uppill is also a member but retiring at the end of 2022. Ludek visited Australia to participate in the meeting as well as have field discussions on mapping Australian terrain with several mappers.

NEWSLETTER REPORT 2022

Three issues were produced by the new editors in 2022. These were produced using Publisher and presented in PDF format, with links available from the weekly enews and also from the Orienteering SA website. No hard copies were distributed. Throughout the year the number of clicks and presumed reads continued to escalate with around a 45% opening rate when sent out to around 2000 recipients.

Verbal responses to the newsletter have been very positive. It's been particularly pleasing to see our younger orienteers contribute their personal stories and we look forward to featuring more like Ethan Penck's JWOC experiences, then Meredith Norman, Abigail and Joanna George' Dream Team's success, and Zoe Carter's Gold Coast win in future issues.

Orienteering SA members kindly supported the project with great reports and articles. Regular contributors of special note have been Robin Uppill (Technical articles), Adrian Uppill (mapping articles) and past editor Frank Burden who has offered a number of articles and short snippets.

SA articles have regularly been of a standard to be shared with the National monthly enews which is available to all Australian orienteers. These have been appreciated by the national enews editor and the reading public.

COACHING REPORT 2022

In 2022 we continued our coach in residence role for Evalin Brautigam. She was a vital member of the coaching and training team and helped with the development of the Southern Arrows and Schools team. She also helped with the initiation and development of the SPOND app as part of the training culture in Orienteering SA.

Evalin's coaching position ended in September when her VISA expired and she return to the United states. We thank Evalin for her commitment to coaching and training in orienteering SA from 2019-2022.

In 2022 we also returned to Southern Darts training program throughout the Winter season. There were 5 Southern Darts training sessions held which were completed with positive responses from athletes and parents.

The Junior Arrows also participated in another successful July camp with over 40 different participants over the 4 days of training.

KID-O is another successful program that was initiated in 2022. This program launched at the Twilight series and many parents enjoyed the ability to teach their younger children orienteering skills at events.

Another successful training session was the Women's Training Day in November. We had over 30 participants attend and we will be looking forward to continuing this in 2023.

Bob Smith continued his role as the Wednesday training coordinator which we are very grateful for. He will continue this role in 2023. This program has been a consistent event for OSA members and we hope the success of the Wednesday training continues in the future. Participation at these events is increasing.

In 2022 Orienteering Australia launched the new coaching levels for accreditation. This has changed to allow easy identification of the different possible coaching levels people could learn. At the beginning of 2023, OA launched an online accreditation program for new and existing coaches.

Bridget has set orienteering goals for 2023 and done much work to implement them. However, Bridget Uppill will be discontinuing her position as coaching coordinator for OSA from October in 2023. She will be creating program guidelines for OSA in preparation for her resignation from this management position.

PUBLICITY and PROMOTION REPORT 2022

Thank you to all the people who supported the promotions and marketing function during 2022. The marketing strategy has been aligned with the Orienteering SA Strategic Plan, with the goal to increase the number of regular orienteers in South Australia, including those who come from non-orienteering backgrounds.

The highlights are noted below.

Marketing Collateral

- With an initial print run of 500 in January 2022, the Generic Orienteering Flyer continues to be available at regular and school events throughout the year and is continually reprinted.
- During 2022, we were able to post event promos to Facebook and Instagram simultaneously for most of the year. Thank you to Tintookies' Max Grivell for his design work, which brought a fresh, modern look to our social media posts.
- Colour-coded After-School Orienteering flyers were developed with graphic design by Max for each School Zone. These were printed as handouts for schools and provided in digital format for school newsletters.
- Bridget Uppill created Pathways to Orienteering Posters for Adults and Children. Special mention to Bridget for all the marketing collateral she produces to support events, training and coaching.
- A 2022 Twilight Series flyer was distributed at events. The 2022 Twilight Series was promoted via Facebook advertising on a trial basis, with an investment of \$30. While there were over 1000 views, there were few click throughs therefore it's thought that at this stage advertising is an uncertain investment. We may revisit this for major events.
- The OY Awards included a wrapup of the year using selected photographs taken mainly by Erica Diment and Evalin Brautigam. Photos for 2023 Awards always welcome.
- Over 30 web banners, rotating on click, have been created with messaging to give website visitors positive perspectives on what orienteering is all about.

SCHOOLS REPORT 2022

In this year's AGM report for Sporting Schools from 2022, I am going to acknowledge all the orienteers who contribute to the Australian Government's Sporting Schools Grant program for orienteering each term, because it only happens with a **group effort**. From the time a school gets their grant money each term, chooses orienteering, and books into the online system, it is many hours of work by many that goes to achieve the final result – which is orienteering (often for the first time) in schools for students.

Firstly, the Schools Coordinator (Zita) corresponds with the teachers to work out their needs and help start the process. This may take many emails, and phone calls. The coordinator also ensures all the extras (like new school maps, O equipment, teacher professional development) are arranged and acted upon. Zita is also managing the distribution of the SA Orienteering O Equipment, which consists of 22 corflute baseplates numbered 31 to 50 plus a Start and Finish, 20 punches with mini cable ties to attach, and 10 A3 ziplock map bags, and 10 A5 mini ziplock bags for the description slips. She orders all the equipment, packs in a padded bag and posts to all schools that request the O equipment, including interstate.

Then, a mapper has to be available, and they get the school's Blams/Samis site map, with an Aerial survey photo, and spend many hours drawing up the map with OCAD, finishing with a site visit to put in the final features. Problem here is they have to do the map asap, because without it, it's hard to proceed past mazes, and the school has to complete the sessions within that term. This places a lot of stress on the mapper to drop everything they are doing, and get the school map done, because the whole process is waiting for the map. Eventually, there is great excitement by schools to see the newly created map.

Then, usually there is a teacher PD session at the school after school hours, to teach staff orienteering tips, go over the teacher delivery guide and go over how to use the free downloadable app Purple Pen to create their courses. Then, the teachers that are doing **their own school delivery** prepare and proceed to do their own orienteering lessons using the Orienteering Australia teacher delivery guide. These lesson plans for year 3+4 called Explore Orienteering, year 5+6 called Learn Orienteering and the Secondary Schools delivery guide, were all updated last year, and with very positive acceptance, and will continue to be updated yearly.

The schools that have **coaches supplied**, provide their lesson timetables, and work out a 4 week schedule for their selected classes to all have 4 lessons. The coaches then liaise with the teachers, and prepare all the 4 lesson outlines for each individual school according to their needs, and using Purple Pen, they create the courses for the chosen activities- map walk, line courses, star relay, score courses etc. They email the teachers what they need to photocopy, and the numbers of maps needed before each session. They make sure they are prepared, SI download printer charged, and head off at least an hour early to set up controls for each session and have maps ready to go. Mostly, schools utilize the day so that the coach has a full day of 6 lessons per day. But sometimes, there may be a gap or two of waiting. Afterwards, there is the hour spent packing up, and driving home. Really a very full and demanding day dealing with our precious little and bigger cherubs!

Coaches also need to be trained, to be able to implement the new O Australia Orienteering Teacher Delivery guide, have a teaching resource kit prepared ready to use, be able to plan courses using Purple Pen to suit each situation and have teaching experience and knowledge to be able to work with large classes of students. But the reward is that the students learn about orienteering, LOVE IT, and get very excited to have the sessions.

At the end of each term, the Coordinator prepares all the invoices for ALL the schools, and the final tax account is emailed from our O SA treasurer – Andrew, and especially in overload times, his helper AI, and the school has to pay and acquit before the Sporting Schools Fund deadline, using the received fund money.

(The treasurer also must ensure that all who receive their tax accounts do pay it, so there is the need for follow up and double- checking. He also financially reimburses with the received fund money, all the many Orienteering SA contributors, who assisted in their various ways, to enable the school to deliver orienteering to the students.)

That is why the role of the School's Coordinator is so vital, to ensure all the team of contributors are on track, and like pieces of a jigsaw, all come together at the end, so that the result is that the school gets to have the orienteering happen at the school / venue, with the students getting access to orienteering.

Then the following school term, it all begins again.

So, thanks to **ALL** who have an input. 😊

2022 Sporting Schools / and non- Sporting Schools OVERVIEW:

For term 1, with COVID still around, we noticed a reduced number of Sporting School applications, and only 5 schools applied for orienteering options, with all choosing to deliver the program themselves. Two schools had maps created or updated. Two schools bought orienteering equipment, three schools had teacher PD and all selected the teacher curriculum and delivery guide.

Schools were **Salisbury High School, Le Fevre High School, Black Forest PS, Mt Compass Area School and Northfield PS**. 535 students received orienteering lessons. Two non- sporting Schools sought orienteering coaches – **Linden Park PP and Heathfield HS** with about 220 students gaining orienteering experiences. Total for term – 685. Coaches were David (2 lessons) and Zita and AI (6 lessons) . Mappers were Evalin (1) and map update Adrian (1). Teacher PD sessions were by Zita.

For term 2, 6 schools applied for orienteering options, with 4 choosing to deliver the program themselves and two requesting coaches. Four schools had maps created / updated and five schools bought Orienteering equipment. Four schools chose teacher PD, and all received the teacher delivery guide and orienteering curriculum guidelines.

Schools were: **Heathfield High School** with 4 sessions for 5 year 7 classes, **Blackwood PS, Tintinara Area School, John Pirie Secondary School, Roxby Downs Area School, and Renmark HS**. About 420 students received orienteering lessons.

Only two non-sporting schools requested coaches – **Cornerstone College, and Blackfriars Priority School**, who had 500 students do orienteering for a Sports Day, so 635. Total numbers for term – 1,055

Mappers were Adrian (2) David George (1) and map update Colin (1)

Coaches at schools were Zita (53 lessons) and AI (32 lessons), Dianne and Colin (12 lessons). Teacher PD sessions were by Zita (2) and Adrian (1) Robin (1).

For term 3, we had a bumper of a term, with 10 schools applying for Sporting School applications for orienteering in schools, with 4 teachers choosing to deliver the program themselves and six requesting coaches to teach 4 sessions over 4 weeks at their school. Four schools had new maps created, and one updated. Five schools bought our SA Orienteering equipment. Two schools chose teacher PD, and all received the teacher delivery guide and orienteering curriculum guidelines.

Schools were **Prescott College, Aldinga Payinthe College, South Port PS, Happy Valley PS, Seaview Downs PS, Hawker Area School, Goolwa PS, Seymour College, St Pius X Catholic College and IQRA College**, with 1013 students. Plus – two non-sporting schools – **Heathfield HS and BlackFriars** with extra 120 students.

Total numbers for the term – 1,133

Coaches at schools were Dianne and Colin (54 lessons), Zita (26 lessons), and new - Anne Oke and Guy Schubert (10 lessons).

Mappers were Adrian (2) Frank (1) David (1) and Aylwin (1).

Teacher PD sessions were done by Zita (2).

Term 4 - There were 6 schools booked for Sporting Schools in this shortest of terms. They were **Hahndorf PS, Birdwood PS, Seaview Christian College - Port Augusta, St Francis of Assisi - Renmark and Redeemer Lutheran College – Nuriootpa, Dara Village, and plus Goolwa PS, St Pius X Catholic** who had coaching this term, and numbers were 896.

St Pius was a large job, with 36 lessons that went over quite a few weeks with 11 classes involved and 270 students in the one school involved. Our experienced coach Peter Mayer was lucky to put his hand up for that coaching role. Four schools did their own teacher delivery, four new maps were created, 2 schools had teacher PD, four had coaches provide 4 sessions for the students. All asked for O SA equipment. About 974 students were involved.

The only non-Sporting School was Heritage College, with 78 students, and sessions were for year 7, 9 and 10 in the Secondary school's area, which is increasing in demand for orienteering involvement. Total for the term 1,052

Coaches were Peter (36) Zita (16), Anne Oke (4), Dianne and Colin (4)

Mappers were Adrian (2), Frank (1) David (1)

Teacher PD – Robin (1) Zita (1)

Total number of students participating in schools for Sporting Schools and non-sporting schools during school time for the year 2022 was about 3,925.

This is an amazing number that had access to learn about orienteering.

Afterschool Orienteering Zone training for 2022:

The **Afterschool Zone support group** was formed at the start of the year, after Robin received a grant for O Australia to promote it. This group, comprising of Zone coordinators, worked together to establish the Afterschool Zones and enable students to access AFTER-SCHOOL orienteering throughout the year.

Alwin's Central Adelaide Zone started off in **term 1**, with afterschool training sessions in and around the Adelaide Parklands. Stirling East Zone also had 4 sessions at their school with huge numbers for each training session. Overall, 243 students participated in term 1.

Term two saw many afterschool coaching ZONES start up and they operated successfully, with large numbers attending most sessions. Ken had developed a new system of online registration for parents, with data being kept on file on an Excel Spreadsheet by the Zone Coordinators. Parents had flyers for the separate zones, created by Max Gribble, that were put in school newsletters promoting where and when, and how to do the online registration. Leila helped with the promotion of the zones.

There were 6 Afterschool Zones that operated in **term 2** for the first three weeks as a lead up to the SA Schools Orienteering Champs.

We had the **Woodside Zone** operating on Tuesdays at Woodside PS - with Zita coordinating and both Zita and Al coaching. The **Stirling Zone** was coordinated by Patsy Burley, with the Burley sisters, and Zita and Al also coaching. Sessions were held at Stirling East PS and Woorabinda Reserve, and Heathfield HS. **Echunga Zone** was also on Wednesdays, with Zita the Coordinator, and Anne, Zita and Al coaching at Echunga PS and the Community Oval. The **Central Adelaide Zone** was held on Thursdays – with Aylwin as coordinator, and Aylwin and Lynn coaching, and others helping. They were held in various places around the Parklands, and Bonython Park. Also on Thursdays was the **Southern Metro Zone** – at South Port PS, with Dianne the coordinator, and both Dianne and Colin the coaches. The last sessions were on Fridays for the **Mitcham Hills Zone**, with Robin the coordinator, and Lexie and Robin coaching at Coromandel PS, Hawthorndene PS and Hawthorndene Reserve. Total of 313 students participated in **afterschool** orienteering training over term 2.

Term 3 had only 4 afterschool orienteering Zones, as a lead up to the SA Schools Orienteering Relay Championships, with some zones changed.

The **Central Adelaide Zone, Mitcham Hills, Stirling and Echunga Zones** were restarted for several sessions, with the same coordinators running the training sessions as last term. Total numbers were 134 attendances for the term 3.

Term 4 saw only the **Central Adelaide Zone** continue for 4 sessions, culminating in a Barbecue and night event that was offered to all Afterschool Zone participants over the year to attend. Sadly, due to distance for many families to travel, this was only attended by one group from another zone – Echunga. However, this was a fantastic way to finish the year. They had 45 attendees for term 4.

Thanks to all our volunteer Zone Coordinators, coaches and extra helpers that ALL contributed to promote afterschool orienteering in SA.

We had a total of 735 students take part in afterschool zone trainings over the year. We did notice it **did** make a difference – and **did** encourage juniors to join orienteering clubs and participate in both the Schools Individual and Relay Championships. They were the students who won the places and received medals. Another worthy enterprise taken on by members of Orienteering SA, and setting an excellent example for the rest of the orienteering community in Australia.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REPORT 2022

1. Club Numbers (number of individuals)

Number overall in the association have continued to grow with numbers increasing by 26 in 2022 compared to 9 in 2021. This represents an increase overall of 6%. Our target is to reach a growth of 20% by the end of 2023 (relative to 2021) which will not be easy to achieve.

Only two people took the opportunity of taking out a new 2023 membership during Nov & Dev. However, a significant number of existing members renewed their membership in this period which has a positive effect on our cash flow. A total of 39 members renewed or took out their memberships after 1st July which showed that the idea of having a half price option for the second half of the year was worthwhile.
